The Announcement

I am pleased to announce the formation of the Electronics Division, effective immediately. The new division encompasses the silicon, III-V materials and optoelectronics business with operations in St. Peters, Mo.; Cupertino and Palo Alto, Calif.; Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia; Djakarta, Indonesia; and Ghent, Belgium.

The new organizational structure is designed to sustain our continuing growth as a major world supplier to the electronics industry and will enable us to fulfill more effectively longer range business goals.

Administrative headquarters for the division will be located in Palo Alto, consistent with the business characteristics of the marketplace and the heavy concentration of the northern California area.

George M. MacLeod is appointed General Manager of the new division, reporting to me.

The unification of the electronic materials and optoelectronic businesses will provide these necessary adjustments for a rapidly changing electronic industry:

better coordination of our marketing effort
improved production control and scheduling to meet the demands of our markets
an improved balance of the manufacturing capacity of our five locations
faster implementation of our developing technology
tighter, more uniform fiscal control

This all leads to a broad and shared marketing, manufacturing, and technology base between III-V and silicon materials and components. This shared technology will let us move more easily from market needs to technical breakthroughs to manufactured products to better profitability.

The Plan

We are establishing a functional organization with separate departments for each of the recognized business needs of Marketing, Manufacturing, Technology, Personnel, and Finance.

This is a large shift for all of us from our previous product oriented organization. It will require a major effort from each of you if we are to avoid loss of progress or follow through during the transition.

Once the transition has been made, watch for a major drive for increased marketplace momentum and operational effectiveness at all sites and in all departments.

The Leaders

The five Plant Managers will report to Stanley T. Myers, Director, Operations, who is responsible for manufacturing, distribution, plant engineering and manufacturing services. Mr. Myers joined Monsanto's Inorganic Division in 1960 after receiving a Chemical Engineering degree from the University of Kansas. He joined St. Peters in 1961. He has held various manufacturing positions at St. Peters, and for the past two and a half years, has served as Silicon Business Director.



New product development, materials research and component technology will be carried out under the directorship of Dr. M. George Craford. Dr. Craford, who received his PhD in physics from the University of Illinois, joined Monsanto in 1967 as a research specialist at World Headquarters. He has held a number of positions in electronic material and device development. Since 1972, George has been manager of Advanced Technology for the electronics groups.
